
## **Local List of Buildings of Architectural or Historic Interest**

## What is a Local List?

The Local List recognises buildings that are not listed or in conservation areas but contribute significantly to the unique character of our area. Below you can find some of the buildings that have contributed to the Local List.

## Key

- 1. 1-6 Station Road 1866-1899 Nos 1-4 Terrace of late 19th century estate workers' cottages and nos 5-6 pair of semidetached mid to late 19th century estate workers' cottages. Locally significant due to age, intactness, architectural quality and group value.
- 2. **St Leonard's Centre 1852-1853** Former school, now community centre, built in 1852/3. Locally significant due to social, group and landmark value, and as good local example of mid C19 school building.
- 3. Yewbank Cottage 1800-1833 Large village house of estimated early 19th century date. Locally significant due to architectural quality, age and intactness.
- 4. The Cottage 1800-1933 Central smaller house of the earliest date book-ended by later C19 additions to west and early C20 to east. Significant due to strength of character, age, intactness and group value.
- **5. The Old Farmhouse 1700-1899 -** Former farm house of early 18th century and late 19th century dates. Of local significance due to early origins, current vernacular character and group value.
- 6. **Methodist Church 1866** Small methodist chapel built 1866. Of substantial local significance due to architectural quality, age, social importance, group value, landmark value and intactness.
- 7. 1/3/5 Hill Road 1800-1933 Row of three cottages of varying early to late 19th and early 20th century dates. Locally significant due to strength of early C19 character and group value.
- **8. 10/12/14 Hill Road 1767-1832** Terrace of three small houses, of late 18th or early 19th century date with modern extensions and alterations.
- Ebenezer Cottage, 15 Hill Road 1899 House, of early and late 19th century dates. Two-storey original block with twostorey 1868 southern wing.
- 10. 42/44/46/48/50/52/54/56 Hill Road 1833-1866 Terrace of rural workers cottages c.1845-51. Two-storeys in a continuous unbroken terrace of nine dwellings.
- 11. East Oakley Village Hall 1900-1932 Village hall, c.1910-14. Prefabricated construction with corrugated iron cladding and roof covering (original).
- **12. 1/2/3 Pardown 1867-1899** Terrace of three small houses of late 19th century date. Two-storey terraced form, each house with two-windows to front elevation and offset porch.
- 13. The Firs, 13 St John's Road 1867-1899 Mid-late C19 house
- 14. Southview Cottage, Oakley Lane 1901 House, c.1901. Two-storey front wing, with modern rear additions.
- **15. Barley Mow, Public House 1833-1866** Public house of mid to late 19th century date. Locally significant due to strength of vernacular character, group value and social importance as public house.
- **16. Elm Cottage 1800-1833** Detached cottage, formerly two of early 19th century date but on site of earlier houses. Locally significant due to strength of historic character and group value.
- 17. 10 & 12 Oakley Lane 1800-1833 No. 10 attached cottage, possibly formerly two, of likely early 19th century date. Locally significant due to strength of vernacular character and group value and age and no. 12 attached cottage of early to mid 19th century date. Locally significant due to intact historic character and group value.
- **18. Crimbles Cottage, 5 Oakley Lane 1600-1799** Detached timber-framed and thatched house of c.1602. Significant due to early date, picturesque architectural qualities, notable group value contribution and intactness.
- 19. Olcote, 6 Oakley Lane 1800-1933 Detached village house of early to mid 19th century and early 20th century dates. Locally significant due to strength of early / mid C19 character, contribution of early C20 addition, group and some landmark value.
- **20. Allans Folly, 4 Oakley Lane 1566-1933** Cob and thatched house of 16th century origins but now largely circa 1930s. Locally significant due to early origins, character of later work and group and landmark value.
